

### Longmore Academy

Longmore Academy is licensed as a private academic school by the Pennsylvania Department of Education. Our diverse student body includes youth from across the state who are enrolled in MHY's residential programs, as well as commuter students from nearby school districts.

In addition to supportive, trauma-informed learning in a corecurriculum framework, Longmore Academy offers individualized instruction, remediation support, school credit recovery, as well as college- and career-readiness planning.

In 2020-21, Longmore Academy enrolled **217 total students**, with slightly more boys than girls. Of our students:



**76 PERCENT** are between the ages of 13 and 17



73 PERCENT live on campus in one of our residential treatment programs



**65 PERCENT** of students received special education services



27 PERCENT commute to campus from nearby school districts



attended extended school year (ESY) classes during summer 2021



**6 STUDENTS** stayed on as commuters after successfully completing their residential treatment

#### Building Self-Confidence Through Trust

Anthony\*, a teen in MHY's residential program, was one of the **first students in Longmore's new Life Skills program**, launched at the start of the 2020-21 school year—and he was struggling. Behind six grade levels in English and math, Anthony was filled with sadness, anger and—at times—rage. When something was hard, or he didn't understand, he refused to ask for help. Instead, Anthony would destroy his work or walk out of the classroom in frustration. As his teacher, **Rene Smith**, gained a clearer understanding of his learning style, triggers and reinforcement rewards, she began incorporating them into his day. Anthony began to build trust and his self-confidence began to bloom!

As Anthony closed his academic gaps, his physical aggression decreased and he became a positive role model for other students entering the program. By the end of the school year Anthony had progressed five grade levels in English and three grade levels in math. More importantly, his sadness has been replaced with a huge, ornery smile; his frustration with a sense of humor and coping skills; and his anger with open communication.

Anthony is preparing to complete his treatment program at MHY and can see the changes in himself since beginning his treatment at MHY. He is proud of himself, and his parents are proud of his progress. He dreams of finishing school and becoming a mechanic.

## MHY Residential Programs

In 2020-2021 MHY Family Services offered three residential programs on our Mars, Pennsylvania, campus:

#### **DIVERSION AND ACUTE STABILIZATION** (DAS)

An alternative to inpatient hospitalization, this intensive program for boys and girls ages 9 to 17 helps stabilize behavior within 28 days so they can return to their homes.

#### **RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT FACILITY (RTF)**

An intensive, structured behavioral health treatment program for boys ages 11 to 18, with specialization in sexual abuse prevention.

#### RESILIENT YOUTH STRIVING FOR EMPOWERMENT (RYSE) RTF

A structured, gender-responsive program for girls ages 13 to 18 who have emotional or behavioral issues due to a history of complex trauma.

### Achieving Academically Through Patience

Rachel\*, a client of MHY's **RYSE residential treatment program**, began attending **Longmore Academy**'s middle school in the emotional support classroom last school year. She came to MHY with a severe trauma history and had never attended school consistently. From her academic assessments, Rachel appeared to be significantly below grade-level in all areas, but specifically six grade-levels below in reading and seven grade-levels below in math. Rachel had not had positive school experiences and lacked confidence in her ability to succeed academically. In addition, Rachel was struggling with mental health issues that often resulted in aggressive behavior, which made working with her a challenge. Her teachers and aides truly were starting at ground zero with her.

With consistent encouragement and reinforcement, Rachel began to make progress, which motivated her. Her goal had been to catch up to her peers academically and she would tell others that she wanted to read and do math better so that she wasn't embarrassed. Her teacher happily reports that she did just that!



Working with Rachel has been a true team effort and it took all of us to help facilitate her progress. I'm so grateful to have such great people on my team. By all of us working together, we've made such a huge difference for this child—and I couldn't be prouder of her or my team!"

MHY Family Services will be launching a new **Short-Term Residential Treatment Facility**(RTF) for boys and girls ages 9 to 17 in 2022.
This unique program for youth from Allegheny County will use evidence-based treatment modalities with an emphasis on engaging the family throughout the treatment process.

Through the generosity of the A.J. and Sigismunda Palumbo Charitable Trust and the Wardle Family Foundation, MHY is in the process of updating and renovating its residential cottages. With a focus on safety, we will be renovating bathrooms and bedrooms so that all vouth who need residential treatment can receive their care in a safe and welcoming environment.

### MHY Community Service Programs

MHY Family Services provides community services for adults, at-risk youth and their families across nine Western Pennsylvania counties. The goal of these programs is to create more stable families so children can remain in the home. We offer:

- **Community Monitoring**—Structured monitoring programs for adults and adolescents including:
  - **Adult Electronic Monitoring**—Allows clients to live at home, keep their job and maintain family contact.
  - Drug Testing—Court-supervised drug testing for adults and youth as often as necessary to help maintain compliance with a court order, as well as to support community safety.
  - Intensive Aftercare and Community Monitoring—For delinquent youth at risk of reoffending.
- **High-Fidelity Wraparound** (HFW)—A collaborative support team for youth ages 17 and under who are living with behavioral health challenges. HFW combines families, friends, schools, churches, neighbors, nonprofits and friends to form a circle of support that meets the child's needs—without relying on social services.
- Multisystemic Therapy (MST)—An intensive, evidence-based program serving dependent and delinquent youth ages 12 to 17 who are at-risk of or are already in an out-of-home placement.
- School-Based Behavioral Health Services—Onsite interventional behavioral health services for identified students.

#### We've Grown!

MHY Family Services now provides schoolbased behavioral health services for students in the Slippery Rock Area and Lakeview school districts. Students learn a variety of coping skills to help them become "social superheroes" to defeat their social and educational struggles. They are learning how to better control their responses to problems, be more flexible and manage their physical energy.

#### Bonding and Healing Through Art


Danielle R.\*, a youth receiving services through MHY's **Multisystemic Therapy** program, had the opportunity to attend summer camp through one of several scholarships provided each year by Dutilh United Methodist Church for youth in MHY's Community Services programs. Danielle was dealing with isolation and oppositional defiance disorder.

Through her experience at Camp Jumonville, one of the camps available to her and her siblings, Danielle reported that she reconnected with God and improved her relationship with her mother. She also rediscovered her passion for art and returned home with paintings she had created at camp. With the support of her MST Therapist, **Pam Simpson, MA**, Danielle and her mom plan to create a space in their home to paint & craft so they continue connecting through their shared talents.



### Getting Back on Track with Support

Jason\*, a young man in our MST program, was repeating 9th grade for the third time and was not expected to graduate from high school. His team set a goal to encourage him to complete his education and identify career opportunities. The support of his committed team, led by MST Therapist Julie Reagle, MA, made all the difference in getting Jason back on track. He is now enrolled to pursue his GED and to enter a welding program. His outlook is bright as he works toward employment and a more hopeful future.



MHY is actively preparing to launch two additional evidence based and internationally recognized Multisystemic Therapy programs for youth and families. MHY will be the first provider in Pennsylvania to provide the Multisystemic Psychiatric Adaptation and the first to launch all three MST programs including the Standard and Problem Sexual Behavior Adaptation.

MHY is grateful for its partnership with Staunton Farm Foundation, which provided program start-up funding for the MST Psychiatric Adaptation.



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
